Annual Memorial Service at Old Immanuel Lutheran in Muncy

Mr. Jim Girven, Lutheran Authorized Lay Worship Leader, will be the officiant at the Annual Memorial Service at Old Immanuel Lutheran Church, Lime Bluff Road, Muncy, on Sunday, June 10, 2018, at 2pm. The theme that Mr. Girven has chosen for the service is “We are Possessed.” Mr. Girven comes to Old Immanuel from the Messiah-St. James Lutheran Parish of Muncy. Both of these churches are “children” of Old Immanuel, and we are delighted to have Mr. Girven lead us in this service. Mrs. Jane Landon will provide music on the church’s antique pump organ.

Old Immanuel is considered to be the mother church of Lutheranism in Lycoming County. Founded in 1791, it lived until its doors shut permanently in 1920. The first structure built on the property was of log; the second and third (the remaining) structures were of brick. The current building was dedicated in 1869, and contains two cornerstones, one in German dated 1832, and one in English dated 1869. At least 9 Revolutionary Soldiers and 5 Civil War Soldiers are buried in the historic cemetery. The church was built on land donated by Henry and Barbara Shoemaker, of “Shoemaker Mills” at the Routes 442/405 intersection.

At one time, there was a school associated with Old Immanuel, and the church contained a gallery, a wine-glass pulpit, and enough straight-backed pews to seat 600 people.

Old Immanuel closed its doors for regular services in 1920, after giving rise to 19 other Lutheran congregations. Some of these have also closed their doors, such as Moreland Lutheran, Trinity (Huntersville), St. Paul’s (Millville), Germany Church, Katy’s Church, St. Mark’s (Lairdsville), Christ Lutheran (Montgomery), Messiah (Alvira), the Stone Church in ElimSPORT, and Zion’s, also in ElimSPORT. Some of these churches have taken on new identities as they have become home to other congregations. Churches that have sprung up from Old Immanuel that continue with the Lutheran tradition include Trinity and Mount Zion, Hughesville; St. Andrew’s, Muncy; St. James, Muncy; Messiah, Clarkstown; St. John’s, Gordner’s Grove; St. John’s (Brick), Montgomery; and Bethany, Montoursville.

The public is invited to attend this service as well as to tour the historic church. Light refreshments will be served after the service. For more information, or to follow Old Immanuel more closely, “Like” us on FaceBook!!!

Dear friends in Christ,

Two years ago I was made aware of an opportunity to apply for a small church grant through our Upper Susquehanna Synod. The grants are made available through the Division for Evangelical Mission of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The grants are awarded to small congregations that are creating ministries to reach out in new ways to their congregation and community. We applied for the grant two years ago to help pay expenses for the Saturday evening worship service that we were developing. The grant funds would go toward our every door direct mailing campaign as well as organist salary. Our grant request was reviewed by the Small Church Mission Team of our synod, and were pleased to receive a grant in the amount of \$3,000 to help offset those expenses. Again this year we took the opportunity to apply for another grant. The grants are renewable for two years in decreasing amounts of funding. This year we applied seeking funds to continue to pay the Saturday evening organist salary, as well as the salary of an additional Stephen Ministry team leader. Once again we were pleased to have received a grant in the amount of \$3,000, more than we had hoped to receive.

The Small Church Mission team of our synod appreciated the initiative we have taken to reach out to the community with an alternative for worship and the success we have had developing the Saturday evening service. In particular, they noted the efforts to touch those members who have fallen away from the congregation or have not had a relationship with the church before. The review team was also pleased with the addition of Stephen Ministries to Zion's ministry of outreach. They see this ministry of caring as another way in which we may give a loving touch to people both within and outside of our congregation. It is a new way to live out Jesus command to “love one another as I have loved you.” I will be receiving a visit from Nick Kiger from ELCA Mission Advancement this month to tell him about our ministries.

With the renewal of the grant this year we will be helped to sustain the organist salary for the Saturday evening worship service. We have also been able to add Rev. Kenneth Elkin, a trained Stephen Ministry leader, to our leadership team. Over the course of the next

year, Pastor Elkin will share training and supervision duties with me. Stephen Ministers must undergo 50 hours of comprehensive training before they are able to serve. Once trained, Stephen Ministers meet for supervision and continuing education twice monthly. We currently have seven persons at Zion receiving Stephen Ministry training. When their training is completed, each Stephen Minister will be matched with a person that needs care.

I thought you would appreciate hearing this good news. I also hope that you may make use of the ministries we are developing. If Saturday at 6:00 pm is a convenient time for you to worship, and especially if you know that you are going to be away Sunday, you are most welcome to join us for that service. Also, we will let you know the progress of the training of our Stephen ministers, and ask that in the future you would let us know when you see someone who could use a weekly visit and their distinctively Christian caregiving.

Please pray for our congregation daily, that we may develop all of our ministries to the glory of God.








SERVICE OF HEALING

Julie of the Wolves – Jean Craighead George

The lesson: You can make anywhere feel like home.

As a college student, this is not just a nice story because of its whimsy, but because of its themes of redemption. Edmund totally ruins everything and betrays all his friends and family, but he still comes around in the end. And everyone's cool with it! Just make sure you learn from those mistakes.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar – Eric Carle

The lesson: If you eat everything in the dining hall, you will NOT turn into a butterfly.

Maybe the message is that if you eat a balanced and varied diet, you will turn into a butterfly. Gaining the dreaded freshman 15 isn't the end of the world, and if you're hungry, then you should eat.

A Wrinkle in Time – Madeleine L'Engle

The lesson: It's good to be different.

This book has sweeping fantasy, genuinely interesting scientific concepts, and a great case for fighting against conformity. Sometimes it can be hard to find your place in college — but hey, you can always start your own club.

The Lorax – Dr. Seuss

The lesson: Do your laundry.

Okay, the actual message is to take action, especially when it comes to protecting the environment. And that's very important, but it's also important when it comes to your personal environment. If you don't wash the dishes, do your laundry, take a shower, and sleep, things are just going to keep spiraling. So, take care of yourself as well as the Earth.

Charlotte’s Web – E. B. White

The lesson: One true friend is worth a lot.

And they don’t necessarily have to be from the same walk of life as you. So if you’re a pig with an undecided major, and your new roommate is a very artsy spider, you can still turn out to be the best of friends. And a best friend is always going to support you.

The Hobbit – J.R.R. Tolkien

The lesson: Get out of your comfort zone.

It’s all well and good to bury yourself in a blanket and binge-watch Netflix when not in class, but every once in a while you need to get swept up in a college adventure. Part of college is being open to new experiences, so go after the occasional dragon. College is a time to venture out of your Hobbit-hole.
