



Dear Friends in Christ,

Dr. Les Parrott in his book "Shoulda Coulda Woulda" tells an old legend about three men. Each man carried two sacks-one sack tied in front of his neck and the other sack resting on his back.

When the first man was asked what was in his sacks, he said, "In the sack on my back are all the good things friends and family have done for me. That way they're hidden from view. In the front sack are all the bad things that have happened to me and all the mistakes I've made. Every now and then I stop, open the front sack-containing all the bad things that have happened to me-take the things out, examine them, and think about them." Because he stopped so much to concentrate on all the bad stuff in his life, his pace was slow and he made little progress.

When the second man was asked about his sacks, he replied in exactly an opposite way. "In the front sack are all the good things that have happened to me," he said. "I like to see them, so quite often I take them out to show them off to people and reminisce."

"But what about the sack in the back?" he was asked. He answered, "I keep all my mistakes, all my regrets in there and carry them all the time. Sure they're heavy. They slow me down, but you know, for some reason I can't put them down."

When the third man was asked about his sacks, he answered in a slightly different way. Like the second man he answered, "The sack in front is where I keep all the blessings I've experienced-all the great things other people have done for me. The weight isn't a problem. In fact, it keeps me moving forward."

But, as for the second sack, he answered, "The sack on my back is empty. There's nothing in it. I cut a big hole in its bottom. Then I put all my regrets and all my mistakes from my past in that sack. They go in one end and out the other, so I'm not carrying around any extra weight at all."



The hustle and bustle of the Holiday Season is alive and well as we prepare the shelter for the much anticipated celebration of Christmas. The excitement of the children who live here is enough to put even the biggest Scrooge in the holiday spirit. "D'angelo", our Elf on the Shelf, is up to his mischief and the kids never know where he will be found.

Again this year, Haven Ministry is reaching out to those in the community who need help giving Christmas presents to their children. This may be a family whose bread winner lost their job, a medical emergency or illness, or grandparents who unexpectedly got custody of their grandchildren. For whatever reason, Haven Ministry wants to meet their needs. In addition to the children living at the shelter, we are providing Christmas surprises to almost a hundred children from the Northumberland, Snyder, and Union County area. This is made possible by the generosity of the people, churches, businesses, and organizations from nearby communities. The holiday season is exhausting, but when you see the smiles, sometimes even happy tears, of the parents, and grandparents when they pick of the gifts, it certainly makes it all worthwhile.

We would like to take a time out to thank you for your cash donations, your donations of household items, clothing, food, and your time and talents. Without your support, we could not have provided a helping hand to those in need.

We don't just house and feed individuals at the shelter, we buy new school clothes for the children and work clothes and shoes for those who need uniforms to start work. We obtained birth certificates, Pennsylvania photo identification cards, and renewed driver's licenses our clients need for housing and employment so they could once again become contributing citizens of our communities. We are also an emergency food pantry, filling an average of 55 emergency food orders per month, supplying bags of groceries to adults and children referred to us by local agencies and churches. We strive to be the best stewards of your gifts as we can be.

We are asking for your continued support as we head into the new year and invite you to come to the shelter to see first hand the outcome of your assistance. Once again, we sincerely say thank you for your support!
