

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Dear friends in Christ,

What do you know by heart? Is there a song that you learned as a child in school that could come right out of you without even thinking about it? Could you sing all of the words of a song that was always on the radio when you were in high school? How about a poem? Did you have to memorize one for a class in school, and it sticks with you to this day? How about presidents or state capitals? Many teachers used to drill their classes on those for tests and people can recite them to this day. You know them by heart. Or maybe there's a favorite recipe that you don't even have to think about anymore, you're putting it together and the ingredients just come off the shelves and you can just whip it up. Some folks know the birthday of everyone in their family or group of friends by heart. They are the ones that always remember to get those birthday cards out on time. Maybe you've got some phone numbers of people who are important to you down by heart. Maybe you worked really hard in third grade and you've got your multiplication tables down by heart. Everybody has a few things that they know by heart that have been useful to them throughout their lives.

The message of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah is addressed to a people who are broken. They are in what we call Babylonian exile, in other words, the people of Babylon had attacked and captured the people of Judah and carted them off to live in their country as their servants. As they lived in this foreign land, the people of Judah began to become aware of why this terrible fate had befallen them. They were meant to be God's people, living out the covenant relationship that God had created with them when he first rescued them from slavery in Egypt. God rescued them and expected them to live well together, living out the laws, statutes, and ordinances that Moses had given to them when he made that trip up Mount Sinai. They had not, however, kept the law of God. They had lived selfishly, not loving God with all their heart, soul, strength, and mind, and not loving their neighbors as they love themselves. Although God had sent prophets to them for over 400 years to warn them about their disobedience, the people did not listen. So the people of Babylon were allowed to take them away.


Jeremiah had been a prophet who had warned them that such a fate would fall upon them, but he was also a prophet of hope. His message was meant to help the people of Judah. The question that was on the hearts and minds of the people of Israel was this: If their sin in the past brought such fearful judgment upon the nation so that it came close to total annihilation, what assurance can there be that after they are restored to their homeland the same fate will not befall them again? The answer comes as the Lord gives prophecy to Jeremiah. "The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another to know the Lord, for they shall all know me, and I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more."

God is telling the people through the prophet Jeremiah, that there will come a time when keeping covenant with God will not just be about the preservation and rereading of laws written on scrolls and tablets. Rather, there will come a time when there will be an inner power and motivation towards obedience on the part of God's people that is written on their hearts. The people will live out God's ways because they know it by heart. God's Holy Spirit living in them will move the hearts of the people to love and obedience.

500 years later Jesus is speaking with Jews who have believed in him. Some of them have looked upon Jesus as the Messiah, the one who will renew God's relationship with his people. What they don't know is that Jesus is about to create the new covenant that they will know by heart. Jesus will make the covenant through his suffering, death, and resurrection. He says to them "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will

know the truth, and the truth will make you free." They get a little confused at this point, not fully understanding what Jesus meant by freedom. They were thinking in terms of political freedom, but Jesus was thinking in terms of freedom of the heart. So he tells them what the new covenant will bring, namely our rescue from sin. "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. So if the son makes you free, you will be free indeed."

Just as surely as God had rescued the people of Israel from slavery to the Pharaoh king of Egypt, Jesus would rescue them from sin, death, and the power of the devil. Jesus would make a new covenant in his shed blood with the people. This would be the truth that would become written on the people's hearts, that Jesus rescued them and remembered their sin no more. Jesus was bringing to them a new relationship, that would move their hearts to live God's ways, in love and obedience. This is the relationship, the covenant with God, that we renew every Sunday when we take the bread of life, and the cup of salvation, in the Holy Communion meal. We celebrate it weekly, so that we know it by heart.

The last Sunday of October we celebrate the Lutheran Reformation. The Augustinian monk, priest, and professor Martin Luther, looked around him at a church that thought it knew the truth, but it was mistaken. Luther was of the opinion that the church, God's own people, was again in Babylonian exile. The church of his day was not keeping rightly the new covenant that Jesus had established. Instead they had created a web of human legalism that trapped the people. The people were caught in the trap of not knowing what their destiny would be. Just like the people of Judah who had wondered if they could keep the law well enough to not be punished again, the people of Luther's church were caught in the trap of worrying if they were doing enough good works to satisfy God, so that God would not punish them with the flames of hell, but reward them with the bliss of heaven. This was decidedly not the covenant of freedom from sin that Jesus freely gave to his people through his own shed blood. The people did not know and understand Jesus words, "So if the son makes you free, you will be free indeed." They believed that their freedom depended upon their own futile attempts at good works and righteousness, rather than the righteousness that Jesus freely poured out upon all of his baptized people.

Praise be to God that the Holy Spirit gave a voice to Martin Luther just as surely as the Spirit moved Jeremiah to prophesy. The Holy Spirit came to Martin Luther, who was himself terrified of his own sin and death, and taught him the true gospel that was written in the holy Scriptures. Luther rediscovered the good news that Jesus brought to his church. Simply put, because Jesus rescued us from sin and death by dying on the cross, we are covered over with the life and the righteousness of Jesus himself. Because of Jesus, the Holy Spirit moves our hearts to love and obedience. God wants us to know this powerful truth by heart.

Martin Luther knew from his own experience that the people would be best served by a church that gave people the Word of God faithfully. Martin Luther contributed to the life of the church of his day and age by translating the Bible from ancient languages that no one understood into common German so that many more people could read and understand. The people could read and memorize and come to know the gospel by heart. Luther also wrote what we call the Small Catechism. This was not a new idea in the church, but Luther put together a collection of the important truths of the church: the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and teaching about the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion. To all of these he wrote simple explanations that the head of a household could use to teach their families the truth that would set them free. The story goes that when Martin Luther's son Hans was a small boy, his father asked him, "Now Hans, how much do you know?" "The whole catechism, Papa, because I know that by heart." "Is that so?" exclaimed Luther. "If you really know that much you are wiser than I. I still have to study it daily."

Why so much study of the words of the Scripture and the words of the Small Catechism? I like to point to the words Jesus said to his disciples on the night before his crucifixion. He told the disciples that he would be leaving them very soon. But he said that it would be to their advantage. Jesus told them, "the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I've said to you." But before the Holy Spirit can remind you of anything that Jesus said, you have to gladly hear and learn it. Attending worship to hear the Word, daily Bible reading, and recitation of the Ten Commandments, Apostles' Creed, and Lord's Prayer help us to absorb the Word of God that sets us free.

As you live and serve with the people of God, may you come to know God's Word by heart. May the Holy Spirit remind you of the teaching of Jesus Christ that you may live the new covenant of love and obedience. May you know by heart the truth that makes you free. *Rev. Erwin C. 


WARRIOR RUN NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS
